
Year	Event
1952	Gov. Carlton Skinner signed Public Law 67, recognizing Guam's potential as an international tourism destination.
1962	President John F. Kennedy rescinded the Navy's wartime authority to refuse entry to civilian visitors for security reasons.
1963	The Guam Tourism Commission was created under the Guam Department of Commerce.
1967	Pan Am flight from Tokyo lands on Guam with 109 Japanese visitors. The Guam International Airport Terminal opened.
1970	Executive Order 70-24 separated the Guam Tourism Commission from the Department of Commerce and renamed it the Guam Visitors Bureau.
1972	The Guam Hotel and Restaurant Association formed.



Year	Event
1976	GVB opened Japan office.
1983	Public Law 17-32 reorganized GVB into a non-stock, nonprofit membership corporation.
1988	The 1 st annual Guam Micronesia Island Fair was held.
1994	Guam welcomed 1 million visitors in a year for the first time.
2011	Gov. Eddie Calvo signed the HOT Bond, funding the Guam Museum and other infrastructure projects.
2013	GVB celebrated its 50th anniversary.
2016	Guam welcomed 1.5 million tourists in a year for the first time.


